"Your honour," the robber continues, "This is my first offence. I didn't hurt anyone. The bank got all the money back. Can you please forget what I've done and let me go?"

Would the judge be just if he let the robber go? No he wouldn't. The judge has to uphold the law and the law requires that a person found guilty of robbery should be punished.
